

Summary of support provided to the implementation of the migration-related measures of EU-Georgia Action Plan on Visa Liberalisation – EU-funded “ENIGMMA” project

July 2015

General: Within the ENIGMMA project, ICMPD organised 2 missions (November 2014 and January 2015) of Moldovan experts to Georgia to provide on-the-spot support in implementation of VLAP, preparation to the EU assessment missions and general VLAP implementation reporting in all areas covered by the 2nd stage of VLAP implementation. Close cooperation and exchange on related issues is established between Moldovan experts and Georgian VLAP implementation task force.

Continued effective implementation of the EU-Georgia readmission agreement, as well as relevant Georgia’s readmission agreements with third countries, and of measures providing for the sustainable reintegration of Georgian citizens (returning voluntarily or not);	Put the reintegration activities under a single management structure so it is managed strategically with clear policy directions. The authorities should continue to provide the mobility centres with sustainable financing and human resources, and increase their capacity in line with the results of risk analysis. An analytical reporting system should be created for estimating the overall number of Georgian nationals returning to Georgia (voluntarily, due to deportation or through readmission).	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Training on readmission application was included in the ENIGMMA organised consular training in August 2014 (61 Georgian consuls participated); • Analytical Report on State of Migration was prepared by a group of Georgian researchers (including the representatives of the ENIGMMA-SCMI Pilot Analytical unit. <p>Effective implementation of asylum legislation, including provision of adequate infrastructure and strengthening of the responsible bodies (staff, funding, training programmes), in particular in the area of asylum procedures, reception of asylum seekers, refugees and other persons in need of international protection, protection of their rights and dignity, as well as integration of refugees and beneficiaries of international protection, ensuring their capacity to self-sustain, to access public services and social rights and to integrate in Georgia, including access to travel documents foreseen by the legislation</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue work developing procedures for issuing visas on humanitarian grounds; • Create a system to monitor the quality of decision-making on asylum applications, based on clear quality indicators; • Guarantee, in law and in practice, the Ministry of Internally Displaced Persons from the Occupied Territories, Accommodation and Refugees' ability to make motivated decisions on the cases independently, and strictly on individual merit. Give rejected applicants or their legal representatives at least minimum access to the Ministry of Interior information on which the negative security advice was based, so that it can be challenged in court through a fair trial; • Develop a strategy to manage the accumulated backlog of cases and a system of contingency planning for sudden influxes. Implementation of legislation, national strategy and action plan on addressing trafficking in human beings, including effective coordination between state agencies, effective protection of victims of trafficking, in particular children, as well as effective measures to prosecute human traffickers and users of services of trafficking victims; provision of adequate infrastructures and funds ensuring decent reception and protection of the rights and dignity of trafficking victims, and supporting their social and professional reintegration	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Review the provision of services, in particular the organisation and operation of the existing shelters, to victims of trafficking to ensure that the needs of those with accompanying children are adequately met; • Review the provision of psychological, medical and legal support in order to maximise access for all identified and suspected victims; • Review the status, remit and powers of the Labour Inspection Department to ensure that it has the ability to identify and respond to labour exploitation and forced labour; • Take steps for enhancing proactive, intelligence-led investigations to all forms of exploitation; • Develop a robust approach to tackling the buyers of women trafficked for commercial sexual as well as labour exploitation, with the joint aims of securing their testimony and addressing demand for such services; 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ENIGMMA will organise a training workshop for employees of the State Fund for protection of VoT in summer 2015 (experts are identified). The summarised results were presented to the SCMI members on May 28, 2015. The study was carried out by the Innovation and Reforms Centre and supervised by the ENIGMMA team and appointed EU MS expert. • EU MS PDP expert mission was organised to MIA within the ENIGMMA project. The expert provided recommendation on further improvement of the PDP within MIA operations and police work. Possible training for territorial police stations are under discussion with MIA.
